Several people did engine-out practice landings, shutting off the motor from several hundred feet to several thousand feet. Wayne's field is ideal for that, with all that grassy room, lots of visibility, the hospital near by, and so on.

Mattie reported on the status of our treasury – it is better than the government's, with \$770 in the bank. We've donated \$50 each to Norridgewock, Bowman, Tozier's, and Knox County airports as a token of our appreciation for their work in the ultralight community. Mattie also gave the coveted MPA Certificate of Appreciation to several others as thanks for their help. They all said they'd rather have \$50, but we think they were kidding...

Our President, Bill has done a lot of work consulting with the FAA regarding the recent restrictions on GA aircraft (of which we're a part), and he reported that while he was stunned by the depth of the bureaucracy, he was able to determine that we cannot fly in the newly defined "enhanced" Class "B" airspace. At this time, some of those restrictions have been lifted, but we still need to stay out of the Class "B"s. If you're not sure, call 800-992-7433 (FAA).

Bill also led a discussion on whether to attend next year's function at Norridgewock, since the alleged "Anything That Flies" event treated us so poorly. Most felt that we can hold a fly-in of our own at that time, but we decided to wait until about a month before the event and speak to the Norridgewock group about their plans for powered parachutes.
