MPA selected to fly Maine flag to Kitty Hawk!

You know the old adage "Be careful what you wish for – you might just get it?" Well, it happened to us. As you remember from last month's Newsletter, the National Park Service and the EAA are sponsoring a program called "50 Flags to Kitty Hawk", where they select one pilot from each state to fly that state's flag and a proclamation from the state's governor to Kitty Hawk, NC.

Kitty Hawk, of course, is the famous site of the Wright brothers' historic first powered flight on Dec. 17th, 1903. There are numerous events planned to celebrate the 100th anniversary of that event, and one of the biggest ones is the ceremonies at Kitty Hawk. They have built an exact

replica of the Wright Flyer, and will re-enact the first flight to the minute on Dec. 17th at the exact spot of that incredible event.

Even though the contest specified individual pilots applying, in our usual way we said what the hell - let's put in an application as a group, and propose to fly the flag down in a relay fashion, like they pass the torch before the Olympics. Well, the selection committee liked our idea so much that we won! This is quite an honor, as there are many outstanding pilots who applied from Maine. In the words of the chairperson of the committee, "We all thought this will be really cool!"

So now, we got to do it!

We've contacted the Governor's office with the official information sent to us by the National Park Service and the EAA, and they are reviewing the material currently. We also contacted the news and television organizations to

start getting some publicity for the event, and started making lists of other people to contact.

We also formed a committee to work out all the details, and to get firm commitments from at least 3 pilots to make the 800 mile trip. Since quite a few of us thought this would be one hell of an adventure, we have firm commitments to

fly from 5 people so far – Jerry Sukeforth, Dunbar Seamans, Jim Holloway, Bill Grusik, and John Gobel.

We expect the trip to take up to two weeks. With ideal conditions and nothing going awry, we can do it in a week (fat chance!).

The way this is envisioned to work is that one pilot will be flying the first leg (each leg being about 40 to 60 miles), while the others set up the next destination airport or other site. No one takes off until the target destination is ready, meaning the second pilot is in place, and can read the GPS coordinates to the first pilot before the first pilot takes off. While the first pilot is flying, and the second one is in place waiting to take off, the third pilot is driving ahead to the next destination. And so on.

Since we'll have more than 3 pilots, we can have 2 flying at the same time at certain places, or we can all take turns flying the many legs of this trip. With any luck, we should be able to fly 4 to 5 hours per day (2 or 3 in the morning, and 2 or 3 in the evenings), and do about 100 miles per day.

Our tentative takeoff date is Friday, August 15th – subject, of course, to numerous variables (weather being the primary).

Wanted – more pilots to Kitty Hawk!

All MPA members are invited on this incredible odyssey. Even if you can't make the whole trip, we welcome you to join us anywhere along the way and fly a few legs, or just hang out with the ground crew for a day or two as we hopscotch across the eastern seaboard. We'll publish our proposed route as soon as we figure it out, so you can plan where to meet us!

The only criteria we set for those of you who'd like to participate is that we all need to maintain the highest level of professionalism, as we'll be watched by literally thousands if not millions of people. As such, we must exercise a high degree of flight discipline, stick to plans as much as possible, don't take any unnecessary chances, and mostly, stay out of the f...g trees!

Directions to Deblois

(DeLorme map # 25)

- Exit 45 off I95
- 395 East to the end it runs into Rt. 1A
- 1A south/east for about 5 miles to Rt. 46 (East Holden)
- Rt. 46 north for about 4 miles to Rt. 9 (East Eddington)
- Rt. 9 east for about 25 miles to Rt. 193
- South on 193 for about 9 miles.
- Airfield on your right, about ½ mile off the road, so you have to look hard. Migrant worker camp on left (Wyman's, I believe).

Directions to Eastport

- From Brewer, take RT 1A to Ellsworth, then RT 1 towards Calais.
- When you enter the Town of Perry, watch for RT 190 to Eastport/Pleasant Point. Take Right onto RT 190 and proceed into Eastport.
- At the Eastport Irving gas station take a hard right. (The road goes left, straight, and hard right) From there follow signs for MPA Fly-In.

So, let's do that. If you feel uncomfortable with this, bring it to one of the MPA directors, and we will take action. I for one, would hate to see our activities severely curtailed because of a few who disregard the rules.
