We mourn one of our own


It is with great sadness that we announce the passing of one of our Maine Powerchute Association members. Joel McCabe.

Joel had lost his brief battle with cancer, and died on January 3, 2005. He left behind his wife Ellen (Scooter), and many close friends at Eastport and in the MPA.

Less than about 4 months before, Joel had become aware of a pain in his chest. Shortly after, he was diagnosed with a very aggressive form of lung cancer. By that time, the cancer had spread to other parts of his body, and it was a very uphill battle from there on. Both radiation and chemotherapy had very little positive impact, and the cancer advanced rapidly until it took his life.

Those of us fortunate enough to know Joel were just amazed by the whole series of events. In

what seemed like a blink of an eye, the deadly disease took this happy-go-lucky, robust, fun-loving, energetic man, and reduced him to a shell before finally ending his life.



All of us from the MPA want recognize the extraordinary efforts of Ed and Carolyn Nadeau, who stayed with, and assisted Joel and Scooter from the beginning of their ordeal to the bitter end. Joel couldn't have had better friends.

I had the privilege of getting to know Joel fairly well over the last couple of years, and came to appreciate his sense of humor, his values, his love of his wife and

family and friends. His laughter, his positivism, his optimism, and his up beat attitude were infectious – you had to feel good after spending some time with him.

As it turned out, I was able to spend several hours with Joel just a few days before his death. He was in great pain by this time, couldn't really get around without Scooter's help, and had to take pills to deal with the increasingly excruciating pain. His mind was still sharp, however, as he came to terms with the inevitable. He had said a few things that I'd like to pass on to his friends and colleagues in the Maine Powerchute Association.

Joel was policeman in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida until he retired about 5 years ago. In his work, he dealt many times with the worst of human behavior. As most experienced policemen, he grew to mistrust nearly everybody except his

fellow officers. As he said, "To us, there were only two kinds of people in the world – policemen and jerks." The friends he

made in the MPA – Ed, Carolyn, Curt, and many others changed his outlook – he said the warmth, the friendship, the caring, and the camaraderie he found in our flying group gave him a new, healthier, and a very joyful outlook on the world.

The second thing he wanted to pass on was more philosophical. He and Scooter

had many plans with ways to spend their golden years, and they started in implementing some of them. However, like most of us, there were things that just got put off – we'll do that next month, or next year... He said he felt very lucky that he was able to get into flying when he did – it was something he always wanted to do, but there were other things that he wished he hadn't put off. And now, he will never get to them. So, carpe diem – seize the day! Don't put off 'till tomorrow the things in life that may bring you joy, happiness, and satisfaction, because there may not be a tomorrow.

We lost a good friend with Joel's passing. We extend our heartfelt condolences to his wife and family – Joel will be with us in our hearts and memories forever.

Funeral arrangements

Following Joel's wishes, there was no funeral after the cremation. Scooter said she will have a memorial picnic sometime in the spring – more to follow on that.
